GHS students hold blood & clothing drives

Student leaders at GHS held blood and clothing drives this month, a way of giving back to the community.

Over 120 students stepped up to donate blood, contributing 86 units to the American Red Cross. The Key Club organized the event.

The clothing drive, part of Spirit Week, was a competition between the freshman, sophomore, junior, and senior classes. All clothing gathered was donated to the Community Clothes Closet that serves Gladstone students.

GCCF plans Pizza/Bingo Night for families

Families are invited to the annual Pizza/Bingo night at the GCCF, the Center's only fundraiser.

Pizza dinner, from 5:30 to 6:30 p.m. is \$3 for adults, \$2 for children, and free to kids age two and under.

Bingo is \$1 per card, with unlimited games.

Raffle tickets are \$3 each or three for \$5.

The event emphasizes the importance of parents and children sharing family meals and games on a regular basis.

Gladstone High tops state graduation rate

In 2014, Gladstone High School continued to surpass the state graduation rate by more than 9 percent, with over 81 percent of students graduating in 4 years.

More than 90 percent of the GHS class of 2013 completed high school, an adult diploma, or a GED within five years.

"We won't be satisfied until 100 percent of students are college or career ready when they leave high school," said Principal Natalie Osburn. "Over 90 percent of our class of 2013 met that goal. In four years, 81% of our class of 2014 met that goal. The rest need more time and support to clear the bar."

At GHS, 95 percent of Latino students, 92 percent of disadvantaged minority students, and 91 percent of economically disadvantaged students graduated within five years. For these demographics, the student success rate is 21 to 25 percent above the state average.

"We don't give up on any student," said Vice Principal Patti Alexander.

Education Foundation supports Gladstone classrooms, kids

In 2014, the Gladstone Education Foundation (GEF) brought in over \$149,000 -- \$71 per student -- to support Gladstone's four schools.

The total includes \$71,000 from fundraisers, including an auction, a community garage sale, a breakfast, and a golf tournament. The group received over \$21,000 in direct contributions and more than \$57,000 in grants.

Over \$106,000 of the funds are being used to support classroom projects, athletic programs, afterschool clubs, a new kindergarten readiness summer program, Saturday Opportunity School, the Family Resource Coordinator, the Clothes Closet, and the Food Pantry.

Gladstone High kicked off their first month's effort with a schoolwide wellness challenge to improve sleep hours and water consumption.

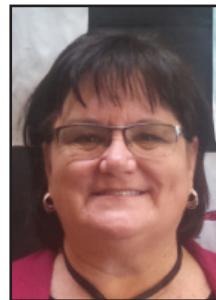
Funded by the OEA Trust, the program has the goal of improving educator health and well-being for all employees.
